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Start of the patient survey in the HzV Thuringia

In October 2012, the Institute launched a written survey of patients participating in the ‘GP centred care’ program (HzV) of the AOK-PLUS insurance.

Now, a random sample of 2,000 insured patients will be contacted by letter. Another survey of the participating HzV-care physicians is planned for December 2012. There are mainly questions on general satisfaction with the program as well as the experiences with the new type of Health Care assistant in general practice (VERAH).

For this we would like to ask you for your active participation! This is how you can contribute to a sound evaluation and honest description of the situation. These results will help in the further development of HzV models and contracts.

Our Health Care Assistant meetings are proving useful: For ‘appointments management’ in general practice’ we have now concrete examples for appointment schedules in practice and developed tips for general planning.

Your actual experiences from everyday life were very important in this matter. The results are now being tested again in everyday practice.

At the last meeting we thought about possible topics for next year; for instance ‘Confidentiality in practice’, ‘Hospital discharge to us’ and ‘From the DMP (Disease Management Program) to the patient’.

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Award for GP Trainee/Residency project

Juliane Mehlhorn, a doctor in the Structured GP training/Residency at the Jena University Hospital, will receive funding on her Project on sepsis consequences

and their treatment options in the out-patient setting by the „CSCC - Flexible Fund“ program. The Project was evaluated by international reviewers of the „Center for Sepsis Control and Care (CSCC).“

Dr Mehlhorns „systematic review“ is the first to summarize and evaluate the worldwide existing treatment options and follow-up strategies for patients after intensive care treatment.

She will consolidate knowledge for best clinical practice on the basis of evidence-based medicine. We wish her every success!

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Assessment of Sepsis work in Jena

This event was eagerly anticipated by over 140 scientists: the official interim assessment of the CSCC took place on the 22 of October 2012 in Jena.

As one of eight nationwide integrated research and treatment priorities (IFB) the CSCC has become a very important entity of the Jena University Hospital in which nearly all departments of the hospital are involved - including the Institute of General Practice. The Institute is represented with the SMOOTH study on long-term management of patients after severe sepsis in Primary care.

The international reviewers now had to decide whether the sepsis research in Jena would be continued.

After a long day of questions we finally had a decision: the sepsis research will be continued in Jena for three more years!

We want to especially thank our colleagues and their patients in Thuringia, Saxony and Berlin. Without your participation the study would not have been possible!
